Bible Reading Plan 2025

If we are to grow in our knowledge and love of the Father, Son, and Holy Spirit, there is no substitute for reading, studying, memorizing, and meditating on God's Word. Hebrews 4:12 teaches us that the Word of God is living and active. Therefore, we want to encourage each other to dig into God's Word every day. An annual Bible reading plan is a great tool for doing just that.

This specific Bible reading plan lasts one year and is divided into morning and evening readings. Each morning reading includes a reading from a Psalm and from the Old Testament. Each evening reading includes a reading from a Psalm and the New Testament. Over the span of the year, those who follow the plan will read the New Testament and each of the Psalms three times, and half of the Old Testament.** (The other half of the Old Testament will be read in next year's plan.) Sundays are left free for deeper reflection and to catch up on any passages you missed throughout the week.

While this plan has identified readings for the evening and morning, the readings of course can be read all in one sitting or at a time that works best for you. If you choose to use the morning/evening structure, you might also consider doing your Bible readings within the context of Morning and Evening Prayer. You can find an order for daily Morning and Evening Prayer on pages 34 & 37. If you're unsure about whether to use the morning/evening structure – as a word of encouragement, doing so can be a really helpful tool to shape the whole of your day in a Godcentered way.

As we seek to pursue more frequent and purposeful reading as a church, here are a few additional thoughts:

- There is no "right" reading plan. Everyone
 is different. If the structure of this plan
 doesn't work for you, find another that
 does. If you already have a plan that
 works for you, stick with that one.
- Read, study, memorize, and meditate. Not one or the other, but all of the above.
- Reading is not the goal. Beware of the tendency to make reading the end as if you have done your daily duty when you rise from your chair. Seeing, knowing, loving, and obeying Christ is the goal of all study.
- If you fall behind, just keep running.

 Don't give up or give in to condemnation.
- It will take work and discipline. Think strategically. Be intentional.
- Read these thoughts on 'How to Study the Bible' on page 6

^{**}The format of the NT readings usually calls for the same three chapters in three consecutive days. Thus, if you wish to shorten the NT reading, you can simply read through one chapter a day instead of three chapters a day. That will allow you to still read through the whole of the NT at least once a year.

Thoughts on how to study the Bible

PRAY

Pray and ask the Lord to give you guidance and help in understanding His Word. God makes many promises in the Bible about the effectiveness of His Word. Every time you read the Bible, consider praying one of the following promises: Psalm 119:18; Isaiah 55:10-11; Hebrews 4:12.

MEDITATE

If you have time, read through the passage multiple times. The goal is to really meditate on a passage, or, if it's a long passage, to mediate on perhaps just a verse or two in the passage. Meditation is one of the keys to really working God's Word into our lives and into our prayers.

THINK IT OUT

Don't jump immediately to application, but first consider the context and original meaning. Ask questions like:

- To whom was this originally written?
- · Why was it written to them?
- How does it fit with the verses before and after it?
- How does it fit within the Bible as a whole?
- Why did the Holy Spirit include this passage in this book or letter?
- What is the Holy Spirit intending to communicate through this passage?
- · What does this passage teach me about God?
- What does this passage teach me about human beings?

THINK IT IN

Now you can think more deeply about personal application and how you will respond to God's Word. Remember: we don't want to simply be hearers of the Word, but doers of the Word (James 1:22). Ask questions like:

- What does this mean today?
- What would the application of this passage or verse look like in my own life?
- What is God saying to me? Why might God be showing me this at this particular time?
- · How should I respond?
 - o Is there an example here I should follow, or a command to be obeyed, or a warning to be heeded, or a promise to be claimed?
 - o What does this passage teach me about God for which I should praise Him?
 - o What does this passage teach me about sin for which I should repent?
 - o How does the gospel impact the way I understand and apply this passage?
 - o If I really believed and trusted what God's Word says here, how would my life be different?

JOURNAL

Consider keeping a journal as you think through some of these things. In your journal consider writing out one or two verses from the passage that are particularly meaningful to you, a few sentences explaining what they mean, and then the ways that you will seek with God's help to respond and apply that passage to your life.

THINK IT UP

Pray. Turn what you have read into prayer. The A.C.T.S acronym is a good way to remember the points in prayer to cover – Adoration, Confession, Thanksgiving, Supplication. Be sure to let your Bible reading guide and shape the way you pray.

An Order for Daily Prayer

THE BOOK OF COMMON PRAYER

In the pages that follow, you will find an outline for prayer for both the morning and the evening that can be used individually, within family worship, or among small groups. The essential structure comes from the Anglican Book of Common Prayer (BCP) – though the content and length have been modified.

If you're not familiar with the BCP, it was developed by Thomas Cranmer during the Protestant Reformation – thus providing churches with a specifically English prayer book. It has for centuries provided Christians with a Bible-saturated and gospel-centered resource to help them worship and pray to God. When we walk through this liturgy, we are reminded of our sin, pointed to the grace of Jesus, and invited to respond in gratitude and faith. Thus, the pattern of the BCP is the very pattern of the Christian life.

PRAYER AND BIBLE READING

We recommend you use this in conjunction with the CCNYC daily Bible reading plan starting on page 8 or on our website. We hope that using these two resources together - Daily Prayer and Daily Bible Reading - will provide you with a rich devotional resource as you seek to grow in your love for and obedience to the Lord Jesus Christ.

WEEKLY COLLECTS

One of the strengths of the BCP is the weekly Collects that are included. A "collect" is simply a prayer meant to gather the intentions of the people and the focus of worship into a succinct prayer that is theologically dense. All of the Collects more or less fit a pattern that was developed and perfected by Cranmer: (1) there is an address to God that highlights an aspect of His character; (2) there is a request made to Him in light of that characteristic; (3) there is a desired invocation and doxology connected to the request; (4) and it is all in the name of Jesus.

Every Sunday at CCNYC we pray the Collect for that particular week. On page 40 is a listing of all those Collects for the whole year. The intention is that you would take the appropriate Collect for the week and pray it every day that week during Morning Prayer.

A FINAL WORD

One final word of instruction and encouragement: it will take discipline, but the shaping influence this kind of morning/evening structure can have is significant as we seek to be formed into God's distinct people in this world. And remember: the goal isn't merely to recite rote words every day. The goal is to let these biblically rich and Godcentered prayers teach you how to pray better. Thus, as you pray these words, let it lead you into further prayer – prayer that comes from your own heart and is in your own words.

OPENING SENTENCES

Most merciful God, we confess that we have sinned against you in thought, word, and deed, by what we have done, and by what we have left undone. We have not loved you with our whole heart; we have not loved our neighbors as ourselves. We are truly sorry and we humbly repent. For the sake of your Son Jesus Christ, have mercy on us and forgive us; that we may delight in your will, and walk in your ways, to the glory of your Name. Amen.

Silence for reflection and/or continued personal confession

ASSURANCE OF FORGIVENESS

If we confess our sins, he is faithful and just to forgive us our sins and to cleanse us from all unrighteousness. (1 John 1:9)

Almighty Father, who gave your dearly beloved Son to die for us because of your great love: Grant that through his cross our sins may be put away and remembered no more, and that cleansed by his blood and mindful of his sufferings, we may take up our cross daily and follow him in newness of life, until we come to his everlasting kingdom; through your Son Jesus Christ our Lord. Amen.

THANKSGIVING

As we rejoice in the gift of this new day, so may the light of your presence, O God, set our hearts on fire with love for you; now and forever. Amen.

The Twelfth Sunday after Trinity (for the week of Sep 7-13)

Almighty and everlasting God, you are always more ready to hear than we are to pray, and are disposed to give more than we deserve: Pour down upon us the abundance of your mercy; forgiving us those things that make our conscience afraid, and giving us those good things which we are not worthy to receive, except through the merits and mediation of Jesus Christ, your Son, our Lord. Amen. (BCP 1662)

The Thirteenth Sunday after Trinity (for the week Sep 14-20)

Almighty and merciful God, through your grace your faithful people do unto you true and laudable service: Grant, we beseech you, that we may so faithfully serve you in this life, that we fail not finally to attain your heavenly promises; through the merits of Jesus Christ our Lord. Amen. (BCP 1662 - adapted)

The Fourteenth Sunday after Trinity (for the week of Sep 21-27)

Almighty and everlasting God, give us the increase of faith, hope, and love; and, so that we may obtain those things which you promise, help us to love all that you command; through Jesus Christ our Lord. Amen. (BCP 1662 - adapted)

The Fifteenth Sunday after Trinity (for the week of Sep 28-Oct 4)

Keep your Church, we beseech you, O Lord, through your perpetual mercy; and, because in our frailty we would fall without you, keep us by your help from all things hurtful, and lead us to all things profitable to our salvation; through Jesus Christ our Lord. Amen. (BCP 1662 - adapted)

The Sixteenth Sunday after Trinity (for the week of Oct 5-11)

O Lord, we beseech you, let your continual pity cleanse and defend your Church; and, because it cannot continue in safety without your support, preserve it evermore by your help and goodness; through Jesus Christ our Lord. Amen. (BCP 1662)

The Seventeenth Sunday after Trinity (for the week of Oct 12-18)

Lord, we pray to you that your grace may always be with us, that we may be continually disposed to do all good works; through Jesus Christ our Lord. Amen. (BCP 1662 - adapted)

The Eighteenth Sunday after Trinity (for the week of Oct 19-25)

Lord, we beseech you, grant your people grace to withstand the temptations of the world, the flesh, and the devil, and with pure hearts and minds to follow you the only God; through Jesus Christ our Lord. Amen. (BCP 1662)

The Nineteenth Sunday after Trinity (for the week of Oct 26-Nov 1)

O God, without you we are not able to please you; mercifully grant that your Holy Spirit may in all things direct and rule our hearts; through Jesus Christ our Lord. Amen. (BCP 1662 - adapted)

The Twentieth Sunday after Trinity (for the week of Nov 2-8)

O Almighty and most merciful God, out of your bountiful goodness keep us, we beseech you, from all things that may hurt us; that we, being ready both in body and soul, may cheerfully accomplish those things that you would have us do; through Jesus Christ our Lord. Amen. (BCP 1662)

The Twenty-First Sunday after Trinity (for the week of Nov 9-15)

Grant, we beseech you, merciful Lord, to your faithful people pardon and peace; that they may be cleansed from all their sins, and serve you with a quiet mind; through Jesus Christ our Lord. Amen. (BCP 1662)

The Twenty-Second Sunday after Trinity (for the week of Nov 16-22)

Lord, we beseech you to keep your household the Church in continual godliness; that through your protection it may be free from all adversities, and devoutly given to serve you in good works, to the glory of your name; through Jesus Christ our Lord. Amen. (BCP 1662 - adapted)

The Sunday before Advent (for the week of Nov 23-29)

God our Father, whose will is to bring all things to order and unity in our Lord Jesus Christ; grant that all the peoples of the world, now divided and torn apart by sin, may be brought together in his kingdom of love; through Jesus Christ our Lord. Amen. (BCP 1662)

The First Sunday in Advent (for the week of Nov 30-Dec 6)

Almighty God, give us grace that we may cast away the works of darkness, and put on the armor of light, now in the time of this mortal life, in which your Son Jesus Christ came to visit us in great humility; that in the last day, when he shall come again in his glorious Majesty, to judge both the living and the dead, we may rise to the life immortal; through him who lives and reigns with you and the Holy Spirit, now and forever. Amen. (BCP 1662)

The Second Sunday in Advent (for the week of Dec 7-13)

Blessed Lord, who has caused all holy Scriptures to be written for our learning: Grant that we may in such wise hear them, read, mark, learn, and inwardly digest them, so that by patience and the comfort of your holy Word, we may embrace and ever hold fast the blessed hope of everlasting life, which you have given us in our Savior Jesus Christ. Amen. (BCP 1662)

The Third Sunday in Advent (for the week of Dec 14-20)

O Lord Jesus Christ, who at your first coming sent your messenger to prepare your way before you: Grant that the ministers and stewards of your mysteries may likewise so prepare and make ready your way, by turning the hearts of the disobedient to the wisdom of the just, that at your second coming to judge the world we may be found an acceptable people in your sight, who lives and reigns with the Father and the Holy Spirit, ever one God, world without end. Amen. (BCP 1662)

The Fourth Sunday in Advent (for the week of Dec 21-27)

O Lord, come among us with your power, and support us with your great might; so that when through our sins and wickedness we are hindered in running the race set before us, your bountiful grace and mercy may speedily help and deliver us; through the satisfaction of your Son our Lord, to whom with you and the Holy Spirit be honor and glory, world without end. (BCP 1662)

Christmas Eve (December 24)

Loving Father, who sent your only Son into the world that we might have life through faith in him: grant that we who celebrate his birth on this most holy night may come at last to the fullness of life in your heavenly kingdom, where he now lives and reigns with you and the Holy Spirit, now and for ever. Amen. (BCP 1662)

Christmas Day (December 25)

Almighty God, who has given us your only-begotten Son to take our nature upon him, and as at this time to be born of a pure Virgin: Grant that we being regenerate, and made your children by adoption and grace, may daily be renewed by your Holy Spirit; through the same our Lord Jesus Christ, who lives and reigns with you and the same Spirit, ever one God, world without end. Amen. (BCP 1662)

The First Sunday after Christmas (for the week of Dec 28-Jan 3)

Almighty God, who gave your only Son to take our nature, and at this time be born of a pure virgin: Grant that we being made your children by adoption and grace, may daily be renewed by your Holy Spirit; through our Lord Jesus Christ, who lives and reigns with you, and the Spirit, ever one God, world without end. Amen. (BCP 1662)
